

Leadership is essentially influence. Leaders influence others. Since each one of us influences other people, we are all leaders in our own right. During his lifetime, Jesus constantly spoke about leadership because he knew that all people are leaders and have a profound influence on the lives of other people. He knew the importance of leadership and called his followers to a new type of leadership, a type of leadership that many people today call servant-leadership. As a follower of Jesus Christ, each one of us is called to exercise servant-leadership for those people that God has placed in our sphere of influence. This week, practice servant-leadership after the heart of Jesus Christ.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the eyes of many, the papacy is a peculiar institution. Still bedecked with some of the regalia of medieval princes, contemporary popes have worked to define their role in ways that give them influence over the world both within and outside the Church. The trappings of royalty, never really a good fit for the successors of Peter, could render a pope distant and irrelevant. On the other hand, the tendency of many to think of the pope as if he were the CEO of a modern corporation is also inaccurate.

St. Gregory the Great, himself a pope, first called the pope "the servant of the servants of God." He is "first among equals" among other bishops, who by tradition exercise significant authority within their own dioceses, not depending on the pope's authority. This arrangement often puzzles those accustomed to a top-to-bottom "chain of command." History has seen popes of many styles, but most strive to live up to Gregory's definition. Perhaps today's Gospel puts it all into the best perspective: "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all." Pray for the pope this week.

Sacrament of Baptism and Confirmation Role of Sponsors

A baptismal preparation class is mandatory for all parents who are requesting Baptism. Baptisms are scheduled with the Deacon. Please contact the rectory office for more information.

Godparent or Sponsor Requirement- You must be a practicing Catholic, in good standing, and attend mass regularly, (married validly if married), at least 16 years of age, and have received the sacraments of initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist). Requested eligibility Certificates for another Parish- We cannot issue certificates of eligibility to any parish if a person is not regularly attending Sunday mass and/or isn't properly registered in St. Joseph Parish .

Sacrament of the Sick In case of serious illness, please contact the Rectory or call the emergency number if after office hours.

Sacrament of Marriage

Parishioners planning a wedding, contact the office to book an available date at least six months or more prior to that date. Arrange for Marriage Preparation Class by contacting www.philamarriageprep.com or call 610-873-2017. Saturday weddings cannot be scheduled any later than 2:00PM. Non-parishioner weddings are up to the Pastor's discretion. If a couple is not a member of this parish, they should request a letter of permission from their 'home' parish.




Feast of All Souls

Great Service

Though Mark's gospel does not have the washing of the disciples' feet found in the gospel of John, today's passage has a similar message. While James and John seem to be close friends of Jesus, they obviously have not learned what it means to follow him. Jesus doesn't make any promises of worldly glory, but he does promise a share in his suffering. Imagine their surprise when he told them that the greatest of them would be the ones who served the rest.

They probably did not know what Jesus meant about their being baptized in death as Jesus would. But then how many people today know that leadership is a form of service? Whether you are head of a family, or of a nation, you were given that authority by God. And God expects leaders to not only direct those under them, but inspire and encourage them to do better.

This connection of leadership and service is all inclusive. A manager is called to help his employees do their jobs better, not by badgering, but by giving the support they need. Military leaders must support their troops with respect as well as discipline. God calls Church leaders in a special way to service of their flock: to protect the weakest members, to give an example of Jesus' love to all, and to be open to the movement of the Holy Spirit in both clergy and laity. Anyone who lives a life of loving service can be "greatest" in the Kingdom of God.

Mass of Renewal

Our new Mass part Mass of Renewal is being used in all of our masses. This melody will be used for the Holy, Holy, Holy 879, the Acclamation When We Eat this Bread 881, and the Amen 883. It has a beautiful moving melody so please sing along with us at mass and 'make a joyful noise unto the Lord'.

World Mission Sunday, 2024: This year's theme intrinsically links our Mission of evangelization to the invitation to the Eucharistic table where the Lord feeds us with His word, His Body and His Blood. It is the place that sustains us with the hope of eternal life, especially for the faithful in the Chitula parish in Malawi. In a makeshift tent, a beautiful Mass is celebrated by priests, whose ordinations were made possible by scholarships from the Mission Society. They come together inviting communities from about a 40-mile radius, as receiving the Eucharist is important but not frequent. As one Missionary said, "There are many well-built churches that are empty in other countries, but in the Missions, hundreds do not even have a simple building to celebrate Mass."

The Church, therefore, is missionary by her very nature. She continues the mission of the Son and the mission of the Holy Spirit by proclaiming to the ends of the earth the salvation Christ offers those who believe in him. We are faithful to the nature of the Church to the degree that we love and sincerely promote her missionary activity. As teachers and pastors we are responsible for keeping alive a vibrant Catholic missionary spirit in the United States.

The collection for World Mission Sunday will be taken up this Sunday, October 19-20th.


